Vee /v/ (*vine*) vs Double-U /w/ (*walk*)

PR Tape 22.2 Listening practice for the consonant sounds -v- (/v/) and -w- (/w/)

Part 1: Listen to the pairs of words. The first word in each pair has the -v- (/v/) sound – the same sound you hear in *visit*. The second word in each pair has the -w- (/w/) sound – the same sound you hear in *will*. Listen:

vine - wine
vest - west

vent - went
vile - wile

verse - worse
viper - wiper

Part 2: Tell which column each word goes in. Words with -v- (/v/) go in column 1; words with -w- (/w/) go in column 2. *Vine* is in column 1; *wine* is in column 2. Say “1” or “2.” Begin:

Column 1

vine

Column 2

wine
